

By the early 1920s, the situation had become desperate for our Germans from Russia ancestors who had remained in Russia. The Bolshevik revolution had deposed the Czarist government and civil war was raging throughout the Russian empire. Our ancestors were common targets of raids, pillaging and violence that ravaged the countryside. The chaos resulted in widespread famine that killed many of our ancestors. Suffering was widespread among the Germans in Russia.

Meanwhile in North America, the massive wave of immigration in the early 1900s had been abruptly ended by World War I. By 1918, animosity toward Germans was common in societies of the Allied countries who had fought the Central powers, with many banning immigration from Central & Eastern Europe. With the end of the war came an economic downturn and unemployment as soldiers returned to civilian life. Prospects for further largescale immigration of the Germans from Russia looked very bleak. Yet, somehow, over 20,000 German Mennonites from Russia were able to immigrate to Canada during the decade of the 1920s.

My presentation will tell the story of this remarkable immigration. The roles of politics and conomics within Russia, Canada and the US will be explained. I will also tell how the immense cost of transportation, combined with the destitute situation of so many of the Germans from Russia, threatened to derail all the immigration plans. My presentation will detail how a key individual stepped into this dismal situation. His untiring efforts somehow turned the desperate plans into reality.

In 1952 a boy was born in Karaganda, Kazakhstan, to a Volga German father and an Odessa German mother. In 1991, he became the head of a newly established Catholic diocese spanning nine time zones in Siberia. The following year, Bishop Joseph Werth visited the Volga Germans of Ellis County, Kansas, where he invited volunteers to come and serve the church in Russia. Learning of his plea, the Sisters of St. Agnes later sent three representatives on a fact-finding mission to meet with him and the German Catholics of Novosibirsk. After a few days with them, the sisters boarded a train and headed west. This presentation shares, in words and photographs, memories of the time they spent with the German Catholics of three large Siberian cities and two villages.

	Russia Heritage Collection at North Dakota State University	

Since 1994, NDSU's Germans from Russia Heritage Collection (GRHC) has acquired items of textiles and clothing that are representative of the Germans from Russia (GFR) in North Dakota and the Northern Plains. The Collection's focus is on Bessarabian, Black Sea, Crimean, Dobrudscha and Volhynian Germans and their descendants in North Dakota and the Northern Plains. At one time, these textile objects helped identify people who were members of this ethnic group. Today, these objects provide evidence of GFR traditions, traits, and experiences as they moved through the world during the Eighteenth, Nineteenth, and Twentieth Centuries. This presentation will highlight GFR textiles and clothing that show how this ethnic group straddled two world views — reflecting both collectivism and individualism, as well as the transition from a home-based to commercial economy. GFR industriousness is evident in the oral traditions recalling their families' textiles and clothing practices, and give evidence of their ability to adapt to the many challenges they experienced. The GRHC Textiles and Clothing Collection is housed in the Emily Reynolds Historic Costume Collection. It is a partnership between the GRHC in the NDSU Libraries and the Department of Apparel, Merchandising, Interior Design and Hospitality Management in the College of Human Sciences and Education at NDSU.

Despite severe losses due to the Stock Market Crash, the Depression and the Dust bowl, Leiker will share how he grew up in a time of harsh recriminations when feelings had to be repressed.

The Herrnhuter Brüdergemeine decided to found the Brüderkolonie Sarepta on the Volga river in 1765 in the program of colonization initiated by Czarina Catherine II. To provide for this community, it was necessary to have a German speaking hinterland. Thus arose after the founding of Sarepta some 27 Protestant villages found-ed between 1766 and 1767 with settlers from the County of Isenburg-Büdingen. These colonies were religiously assisted by the Herrnhuter Brüdergemeine.

STANDING RULES OF ORDER

INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION OF AMERICAN HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF GERMANS FROM RUSSIA 2022 INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION AND ANNUAL MEETING STANDING RULES OF ORDER

LEGAL AND PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITIES:

The Colorado Revised Statutes, as Amended, Title 7: CORPORA-TIONS AND ASSOCIATIONS, Articles 20 through 29: Nonprofit Corporations. The Articles of Incorporation as certified by and in the State of Colorado March 25, 1974, and amended August 9, 1974, and the Bylaws, as amended August 17, 2006.

Robert's Rules of Order, current edition, (as required by Bylaws Article X), in all cases not provided for by Colorado State Law, the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, or the following Standing Rules of Order.

STANDING RULES OF ORDER:

The following rules, adopted by the Board of Trustees and membership, shall prevail during the (year) Annual Meeting and, as appropriate, to Foundation business during the Joint Memberships Meeting.

- 1. Reports of officers shall be in writing, except those of the International Foundation President and Treasurer whose reports are limited to five (5) minutes.
- 2. Committee reports are limited to five (5) minutes, except for the Finance committee whose report is limited to 10 minutes.
- 3. A member making a motion must rise, state his/her name, address the Chair, and be recognized. The same rule applies to the member making a second.
- 4. All motions must be reduced to writing and must be submitted to the Chair at the time the motion is made. Any amendment to the motion as originally proposed must also be submitted in writing to the Chair at the time the amendment is made.
- 5. If proceedings give rise to discussion, a member may speak three (3) minutes for or against a motion. Timekeepers will present a one (1) minute and a thirty (30) second warning to the member so that he/she may conclude his/her remarks within the three (3) minute limit. A member may speak a second time to the same motion only after all others present and wishing to speak have been heard for the first time.
- 6. Except where written ballot is required by Robert's Rules of Order or Colorado State Law, all votes will be viva voce. The chair retains the right to require a show of hands or a standing count when a clear majority cannot be easily determined. When written ballot is required by Robert's Rules of Order, the Chair will make provisions for such a vote in an expeditious manner. When written ballot is required by Colorado State Law, the procedures required by the statute will be followed.
- 7. Except where two-thirds vote is required by the Bylaws, Colorado State Law or these Standing Rules, decisions will be by simple majority.
- 8. Except as required by Colorado State Law, decisions depend upon those members present at the Annual Meeting and voting. Any member, with just cause, may challenge the right of a person to vote. The roster of paid-up members of AHSGR, as maintained by AHSGR Headquarters staff, will determine a person's eligibility to vote (Reference Bylaws Article I. Membership).
- 9. Nominations will be governed in accordance with Article IV, Sections C, D, E, and F and Article VI, Section C of the Bylaws. A slate of candidates will be presented by the Nominations Com-

mittee. However, nominations from the floor are in order. Nominations from the floor shall be limited to one nomination speech of two (2) minutes and one seconding speech of one (1) minute for each nominee.

- 10. If there is only one (1) nominee to fill the Representation District position(s) on the Board of Trustees, a motion may be accepted that the individual(s) be elected by acclamation. All positions having more than one nominee require election by written ballot. A majority vote of the members voting elects.
- 11. In case of need, these Standing Rules of Order may be suspended by two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, except as dictated by the Legal and Parliamentary authorities listed above.

AMERICAN HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF GERMANS FROM RUSSIA 2021 INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION AND ANNUAL MEETING STANDING RULES OF ORDER

Legal and Parliamentary Authorities:

The Colorado Revised Statutes, as Amended, Title 7: CORPORA-TIONS AND ASSOCIATIONS, Articles 20 through 29: Nonprofit Corporations. The Articles of Incorporation as certified in 1968 in the State of Colorado and the Restated Articles of Incorporation adopted June 25, 1977, and the Bylaws as adopted July 8, 2004, shall govern all proceedings of the Society.

Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, current edition, in all cases not provided for by Colorado State Law, the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, or the following Standing Rules of Order.

Standing Rules of Order:

The following rules adopted by the Board of Directors shall prevail during convention general and business sessions.

- 1. Members are urged to assemble five (5) minutes before scheduled meeting time.
- 2. Reports of officers are limited to five (5) minutes (except that of the International President).
- 3. Committee reports are limited to three (3) minutes. A member making a motion must rise, state his/her name, address the Chair, and be recognized.
- 4. All motions must be made in writing and must be submitted to the Chair at the time the motion is made. Any amendment to the motion as originally proposed must also be submitted to the Chair in writing at the time the amendment is made.
- If proceedings give rise to discussion, a member may speak three
 (3) minutes for or against a motion. Timekeepers will present a one (1) minute and a thirty (30) second warning so the member may conclude his or her remarks within the time limit.
- 6. A member may speak a second time to the same question only after those present and wishing to speak have had the opportunity.
- 7. Any member may present a Resolution to the Resolution Committee. Deadline is 24 hours prior to the scheduled Resolutions Committee report. Resolutions shall be presented only through the Resolutions Committee. Resolutions may be handed in at the Convention Registration Desk.
- 8. These Standing Rules of Order may be suspended by two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, except as dictated by the Legal and Parliamentary authorities listed above.

American Historical Society of Germans from Russia Annual Membership Meeting 14 July 2021 (Online Zoom Conference Due to COVID-19 Pandemic)

CALL TO ORDER: The American Historical Society of Germans from Russia Annual Membership Meeting was called to order by President Mike Heil by 11:25 a.m. CST.

Welcome and Roll Call: Conference Channel A - Mike Heil - Presiding

President's Report: Mike Heil -

Quorum check to start the meeting – verified by both visual count of 100 attendees and verified in person attendees at AHSGR headquarters. Sue Nakaji is the appointed timekeeper and Jerry Siebert is Parliamentarian.

Message from Mike Heil – Acknowledgment of and thank you to all for attending our Annual Membership Meeting and the presence of both the Society and Foundation Boards attending this meeting. Thanks for coming on board and keeping things going.

Message from Mike – As my presidency winds down, I feel the organization is better considering all of the challenges of this past year, with COVID being at the top of the list. I consider this to be a significant achievement on the part of our board, staff and volunteers, as a year ago, COVID caused many major disruptions, with everything from the hours we allow visitations, to how we conduct meetings, to keeping staff protected in the work environment. At present, I know of no COVID exposures that occurred at headquarters, and I consider this a major accomplishment mixed with a lot of good fortune, for which we're all grateful.

Also, I'm credibly pleased with the progress of our new membership website platform that is underway. I'll say the opportunity to preserve our culture and sustain our organization is being given a new life in the digital world. I was not confident in starting the year with anything being done, other than the planting the seed, with the thought that we needed to improve our digital presence. Bylaws: David Ralston presenting -

BOD approved two amendments to bylaws on pg. 46 & 47 of program; a third allow changes for quorum requirements.

Article XIX, Electronic Meetings (New): Allowing for electronic virtual meetings for Members, Board of Directors and Executive Committee, or any other committee. (See pg. 46 of Convention Program for full verbiage.)

Article VIII, Executive Committee, Section B: Grants Executive Committee authority to call a meeting by remote communication and allow this to constitute presence in person at the meeting for all purposes, including quorum and voting, but only if remaining connected to the meeting via electronic means for the entirety of the meeting.

Article V, Section C: Change quorum requirements to – One hundred (100) members in good standing in attendance for the Annual Membership Meeting shall constitute a quorum.

District Reapportionment occurs every four years. Every year 10 board positions change. If not elected at board meeting; positions remain open.

The nominating committee met via zoom Board of Director's meetings to determine open board positions and confirm candidates for those positions.

Currently 5 positions remain open and are identified in the 2021 Board of Directors Nomination's list in the conference online booklet.

All nominations, from the floor during the annual meeting, must have nominees' agreement to serve. Appointments for 1 year for remaining open positions will be filled by board appointments. Members interested in filling open positions by appointment must submit a resume to the nominating committee.

For a recap:

Distinguished Service Award: Mike Heil/ Karen Soeken presenting –

This award is presented by the Membership Committee, of which, Karen Soeken is Chair. Background

information excerpts from your online program from Mike Heil:

Duane Stabler's ancestors immigrated to South Dakota from Klein Neudorf (Glueckstal), Hoffnugstal (Odessa and Bessarabia) and Worms (Beresan). He was raised in Eureka, South Dakota, and attended Northern State University. Duane married Dorothy Wangler whose ancestors are also from colonies in the Black Sea Region.

Duane's interest in his heritage began when he was six years old when he found out his grandfather was born in Russia. While living in Minnesota in 1982, he joined the North Star Chapter and attended his first convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where he was identified as a 'Glueckstaller' by Art Flegel, which led Duane to become involved in the Glueckstal Colonies Research Association, where he is now the leader of the group. Duane served in many capacities in the North Star Chapter, including President, Vice President of Membership, Director and Webmaster. Through his efforts, the North Star Chapter became affiliated in 2005 with both AHSGR and GRHS. In 2018, Duane and Dorothy retired to Frisco, Texas, and he helped charter the North Texas Chapter, which was chartered as a joint chapter of AHSGR and GRHS. Duane was featured in the Dallas Genealogy Society newsletter and had grown the North Star Chapter to over 50 members in six months. According to members of his chapter, "Duane's way of letting membership decide on the path we wanted to make it 'our' chapter and not 'his new chapter' by creating an atmosphere of ownership...The chapter now has a growing library, a Facebook presence, newsletter and website...He has continued to promote Germans from Russia and our chapter via email. He is also active in networking with others interested in genealogy in general and serving as a speaker for meetings and webinars."

Duane is an avid postcard collector, with over 5,000 postcards currently. Duane's alma mater recently exhibited 70 vintage cards from his collection. They were images of towns and rural locations known for having a substantial community of Germans from Russia. The AHSGR International Distinguished Service Award is presented to Duane Stabler on July 14, 2021, for exceptional and meritorious service.

Karen mentioned that a full biographical write up is on pg. 17 and on a poster at headquarters.

Mike Heil called Duane personal to present the award to Duane and commented that he is very deserving of this award.

Comments from Duane – Thank you and I'm very humbled by this honor. He thanked his mentors – Margaret Freeman; Lew and Donna Marquardt and the North Star Chapter were also a tremendous influence. With eight million people to find in the US. Challenge, Duane issued a challenge to all chapters to seek out others to join chapters. He was unsure about succeeding in North Texas but found AHSGR headquarters to be very helpful and supportive. He will share the award with the Chapter, as well.

Ancestral Records/Genealogy Committee 2022 Annual Report

The Ancestral Records Committee had a busy year beginning with the expansion of the current library. The wall, which divided the library and the Board of Directors room, was removed, which expanded and doubled the library stack area for our organization. A generous space remains for board meetings and the Flegel Library was relocated to the newly expanded area. Additionally, we received, from the same foundation, a grant to begin digitizing the microfilm in our library. This is obviously a great step for our society and is part of our plan to digitize all our resources.

We welcomed new part time Librarian Ellen Vorderstrasse to our staff and have hired an Archivist, the first for our society, who will join our team in late June.

With our new website, our goal is to bring many of our products to our membership who cannot make it to Lincoln. Members will, in the future, be able to view many of our records on the new web site. We started this process this past year by placing the "passports to freedom" names online in flipbook format. We also placed the 1811 census records, of approximately 34 villages, on the web site in flipbook format for searching.

Treffen Tuesday is the new highlight of our committee bringing interesting programs from around the world to your home via ZOOM. These programs are presented on the last Tuesday of the month. Invitations are sent out to all members, every Tuesday, to register and join these fascinating programs. All sessions are free.

The small publishing group continues to purchase and translate records from Russia and make them available to members. To date, our group has published 79 printed documents of various vital statistics from a wide variety of villages. We continue to obtain records with the funding that is available for records. The records can be very costly, especially when we must pay for translations. Some of the villages in translation now: Engels, Graf, Urbach, Dietel, Balzer, and Anton to name a few.

Various other projects:

- EWZ Records more information to be available for members later in 2023.
- Aussiedler Project translation and transcription of cassettes of interviews of Germans from Russia will be available to our membership via our website as tapes are prepared.
- Letters From Hell (1920-1921 Completed) translated and printed in chronological order. The letters will be released as formatting is completed.
- Deportation Records being prepared for member viewing late 2023 or early 2024
- Village Coordinators new guidelines will be presented this year
- German Origins working to update for our website.
- Clues for 2024 to be prepared for digital publication

This year, one of our goals was to determine just how many members AHSGR has. When we switched to the new website, Bob Ahlbrandt pointed out many discrepancies and inconsistencies. With his help and the committee's ongoing efforts to clean up the membership list, we are confident that as of May 16, 2022, Membership report says 2,467 members. This number includes all types of memberships: Standard (1083), Sustaining (208), Life (1080), Organization (76), Student (18), and Youth (2). In the future, we will be able to use this number as a base for determining membership goals.

One of the focuses of the committee was to determine the status of chapters. The first step was to update the chapter leaders' list. Then a survey was developed and sent out to chapters with 9 chapters returning them. On-going efforts are being made to reach out to individual chapter leaders to encourage participation. It is easy to jump to the conclusion that lack of submission always equates to lack of activity, but we don't think that is necessarily the case.

To help retain membership, the Committee launched the quarterly AHSGR Book Club. We also send out a recipe each month that encourages conversation and outreach.

The Committee helped the Northeast Kansas Chapter (Topeka) participate in the Heartland Family History Conference in Topeka by setting up a booth there and running an ad in their conference booklet. 2022 Annual Report

The most significant achievement of the past year was the completion of the new website (https://ahsgr.org), culminating in go-live on December 8, 2021. This project was the result of the tremendous effort of a project team led by Lee Macklin, former Technology Committee chair Dennis Zitterkopf, and our web development service vendor, Lee Media Group. We successfully migrated our membership database, on-line store, publications, and research materials from the legacy website. It is a testament to our core values that this project was completed on time and on budget despite unanticipated challenges and complexity.

The new website provides a state-of-the-art platform that will accommodate ongoing addition of new content and enables direct contributions by content generators (e.g., Chapters). Several enhancements to the new website were completed after go-live. These enhancements improved the membership renewal interface and on-line payment process. Further enhancements are planned and will be released on an ongoing basis.

Members are encouraged to login to the website to access member-exclusive content. Please update your membership profile, including surnames and villages of interest. This will help other members connect with you. If you have difficulty logging in to the website, please contact AHSGR headquarters for assistance at <u>help@ahsgr.org</u> or (402) 474-3363.

In conjunction with the new website, a new Privacy Policy was released. This policy describes AHSGR's commitment to protect the personal information of users of AHSGR's services. This policy is posted on the AHSGR website at <u>https://ahsgr.org/privacy-policy/</u>.

We supported implementation of a new Library Management System, moving from ResourceMate to Apollo Biblionix software. This is an industry-standard hosted solution accessible from our website (<u>https://ahsgr.biblionix.</u> <u>com/catalog/</u>). As part of this change, the AHSGR library holdings are being barcoded.

Microsoft Teams is now being utilized to support headquarters, Board of Directors, and Committee activities.

We made several updates to the technology infrastructure supporting headquarters: a new phone system from Allo Communications, new Wi-Fi access points, and a new uninterruptable power supply for the server. We purchased equipment to support new staff positions as well as the regular equipment replacement program: 4 laptop computers/docking stations, 1 desktop computer, 5 monitors, 3 printers and 1 scanner. The service contract was renewed with Bizco Technologies for technology support of headquarters.

PROPOSED BYLAW REVISIONS 2022 Annual Meeting

The Board of Directors recommends the following revisions to the AHSGR Bylaws be considered at the 2022 Annual Meeting.

PROPOSED CHANGE	RATIONALE
Article VI: Board of Directors Section F. The at-large District shall have three (3) representatives, no more than one (1) representative shall be from any one of the representation Districts.	Removing the limitation will make it easier to fill positions on the Board of Directors.
Article VI: Board of Directors Section L. Except herein provided, no person shall be appointed or elected to the AHSGR Board of Directors, who at any time within the past year, shall have served on the Board of Directors of AHSGR. No member shall serve simultaneously as a member of the Board of Directors of AHSGR and the Board of Trustees of the AHSGR Foundation.	It appears that the first sentence was intended to keep someone who had reached term limits from then being appointed to the board. However, term limits were removed in 2008.
 Article VI: Board of Directors Section O. Any member of the Board of Directors may be removed with or without cause as follows: A director elected by the Membership may be removed by the Membership only at a meeting called for the purpose of removing that director. The meeting notice shall state that the purpose, or one of the purposes, of the meeting is removal of the director. The director may be removed only if the number of votes cast to remove the director would be sufficient to elect the director at a meeting to elect directors. A director elected or appointed by the Board of Directors may be removed by the vote of a majority of the directors then in office. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for submitting a recommendation to the Membership or to the Board of Directors with respect to the removal of a director under the provisions of this Section O. The Executive Committee shall assemble such information as it deems necessary to substantiate its recommendation and provide sufficient notice to the director in subject to removal and to the Membership or the Board of Director's removal. At least one (1) member of the Executive Committee shall be present at the meeting to conduct the meeting and to respond to questions by those in attendance. Upon receipt of the meeting notice, the director subject to removal shall be on leave of absence status with respect to the director's position on the Board of Directors. 	Current Bylaws provide for the resignation of a member from the Board of Directors and replacement of that member. Adding Section O provides for removal of a member from the Board of Directors and complies with the Colorado Revised Stat- ues for Nonprofit Corporations, Section 7-128-108 – Removal of directors.
 Article VII: Elections Section D. Nominations from the Floor 3. If there is no nomination from the floor for an opening in a Representation District of a member from that District, out-of-District nominations will be accepted for the open position. 	Currently if Board positions are not filled by elections, then the Board of Directors appoints member for a one-year term. The individual need not come from the district. Adding #3 al- lows for a minimum number of board members with temporary one-year appointments.

Timothy Kloberdanz

Dr. Timothy J. Kloberdanz is a Professor Emeritus at North Dakota State University in Fargo. An AHSGR Life Member, he traces his ancestry to a number of Volga German colonies, particularly

To date, he has authored or co-authored ten books and numerous articles, essays, and poems. In 2001, Dr. Kloberdanz received the North Dakota Governor's Award in recognition of his efforts to promote folklore and folk art education in the schools. This fall semester, Dr. Bates will teach a course on German language and immigration in South Dakota to undergraduate students.

Wayne Bonner has been interested in his ancestry since childhood. He would often ask his mother questions about life in the German South Bottoms of Lincoln



where she was born and later raised in Chicago. Wayne could never understand how a German could be born in Russia. As Wayne grew older and got into genealogy, this question continued to intrigue him. 
